Patient & Public Involvement (PPI) is when you as researchers actively work with lay people to help you in the full research cycle.

The National Institute for Health Research says that "public involvement in research is an essential part of the process by which research is identified, prioritised, designed, conducted and disseminated."

It is <u>not</u> about people who are subjects of your research – we call them participants.

It is <u>not</u> about any public engagement work you might do, where you give talks to the public or take part in a science festival etc.

Why do we involve PPI contributors?

There are two fundamental reasons;

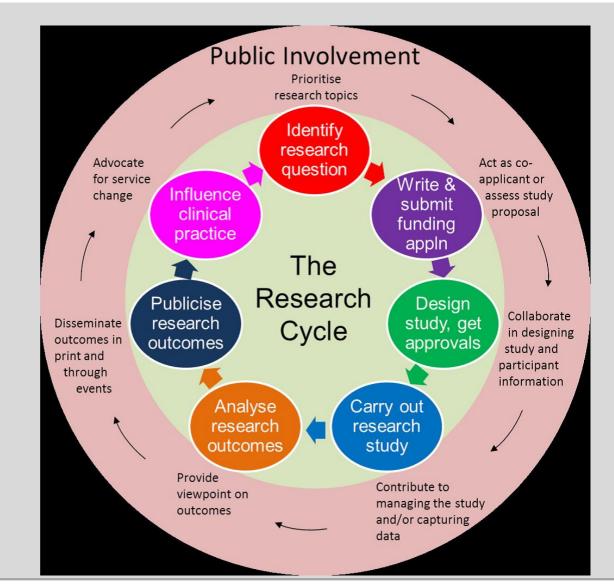
- 1. It is a public right to be involved because it is public money being spent. Either through taxes, or through charitable giving. It is also the public who will be affected by the research outcomes.
- It will make our research better.

Here we tend to work on the principle that both of these reasons are equally valid.

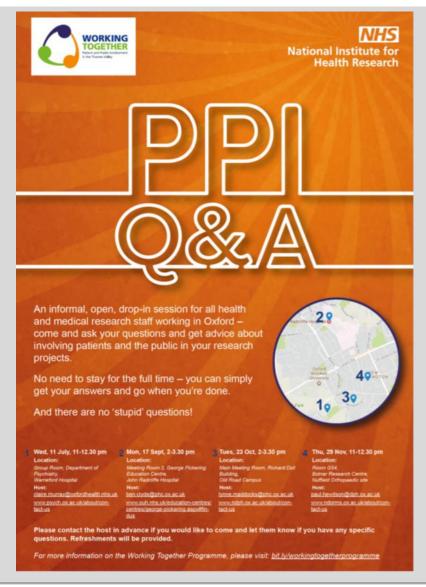
